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"WOUND INFECTION TOP REASON FOR READMISSION AFTER SURGERY"

INTRO: After undergoing surgery and being discharged from the hospital, the last thing a patient wants is to be readmitted for complications. Hospitals also face financial penalties if readmission rates, including those for surgical complications, are too high. A new study looked at the most common reasons patients return to the hospital after undergoing surgery. Catherine Dolf explains in this week's JAMA Report.

KARL BILIMORIA FROM THE FEINBERG SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AT NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY AND CO-AUTHORS EXAMINED THE REASONS WHY PATIENTS RETURN TO THE HOSPITAL AFTER UNDERGOING SURGERY. RESEARCHERS LOOKED AT ONE YEAR'S WORTH OF DATA FROM THE AMERICAN COLLEGE OF SURGEONS, NATIONAL SURGICAL QUALITY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM. THEY FOCUSED ON SIX REPRESENTATIVE OPERATIONS INCLUDING BARIATRIC PROCEDURES, TOTAL HIP OR KNEE REPLACEMENTS AND HYSTERECTOMY.

It also gives policy makers some information about how to craft readmission reduction programs going forward particularly for surgery because the reasons for why patients are coming back to the hospital really relates to expected complications."

TAG: THERE WAS ALSO NO SPECIFIC TIME FRAME FOR WHEN PATIENTS RETURNED TO THE HOSPITAL AFTER SURGERY. READMISSIONS, WHETHER BEFORE OR AFTER SEVEN DAYS, WERE STILL ASSOCIATED WITH WOUND INFECTION OR PROBLEMS WITH BOWEL FUNCTION AND NUTRITION.
