

June Consumer Spending and Saving 2012 Summer Jobs and Chores

Research Method




- This research was completed online among a random sample of consumers aged 18+. A total of 2,008 interviews were completed.
- In addition to a general population sample, two sub-groups, Affluents and Consumers with children under 18, were targeted and balanced by the general population.
 - Affluents defined as having a minimum annual household income of \$100,000 (n=631)
 - Consumers with children under 18 (n=918)
- Interviewing was conducted by Echo Research between June 5 8, 2012.
- Overall the results have a margin of error of ± 2.2 (or ± 3.9 among Affluents and ± 3.2 for consumers with children in household) percentage points at the 95% level of confidence.
- The results highlighted in this report are among parents with teenagers, age 13 to 17, (n=480) and have a margin of error of ± 4.5 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence.


Many Teenagers Still Primarily Resource their Income From their Parents via Allowance



According to parents of teens (38%), their child's primary income this summer will be allowance they earn, followed by roughly one third (32%) who cite a summer job.

Affluent parents of teens say their child will equally resource money from parental allowance and a summer job (37% each).









Baby Sitting and Fast Food Service Top the List for Teenagers whose Primary Income is their Job



Those whose teenager depends on a summer job (32%) for their primary income cite babysitting/nanny and fast food service (18% each) at the top of the summer job list.







The Majority of Children are Responsible for Chores this Summer



Nine in ten parents of kids 6 to 17 indicate their children will be responsible for chores this summer. Those who say their children will have chores this summer cite cleaning their room at the top (87%).
