



POLITICAL CONTEXT

NATIONAL LEVEL:

- In July 2025, Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra (Pheu Thai party) was suspended from office by the Constitutional Court following a leaked phone call with Cambodia's former leader in a context of regional tensions. She had served as Prime Minister since September 2024, leading a coalition whose priority was to stabilise the government and address economic difficulties.
- In September 2025, the Parliament of Thailand elected Anutin Charnvirakul, leader of the Bhumjaithai Party (former member of the government coalition) as Prime Minister. His election came under the condition that a new general election would be organised within the coming months. Anutin Charnvirakul is therefore leading a caretaker government.
- The likely date for the general election is 29 March 2026
- Internationally, the relationship between Thailand and Cambodia has deteriorated and a territorial dispute escalated into an armed conflict in July 2025. A ceasefire was signed on 28 July but tensions remain.

REGIONAL/MUNICIPAL LEVEL:

- Chadchart Sittipunt (former member of the Pheu Thai party, now independent) was elected Governor of Bangkok by winning all the city's municipal districts. He had served as Minister of Transport between 2012 and 2014.
- The Governor of Chonburi Province, Thawatchai Srithong, was appointed by the Ministry of the Interior in October 2022. His priority has been to ensure both economic and tourism development and public safety.



- Freedom of expression is limited with restriction of press freedom and surveillance and intimidation of advocacy groups and government critics

Using 40 performance indicators across 11 issue categories, the EPI ranks 180 countries on climate change performance, environmental health and ecosystem vitality.

SAFETY AND SECURITY CONTEXT

Security Forces	- Thailand possess the overall capacity to manage large international sporting events although the Royal Thai Police and security forces are often criticised for suppressing dissent, with the legal environment remaining restrictive.
Crime	- Petty crime and scams targeting foreigners are common in urban and tourism areas.
Terrorism	 Thailand faces an ongoing threat from domestic insurgency. However, the risk of attacks is generally restricted to the southern border provinces of Narathiwat, Yala, Pattani and parts of Songkhla, with Bangkok and Chonburi not impacted.
Infrastructure – Water, Telecommunication, Technological and Cyber risks	 Thailand faces water security challenges linked to rapid urbanisation and changing climate. Bangkok has advanced telecommunications infrastructure and widespread mobile and broadband coverage. Thailand faces elevated espionage risks, particularly in strategic sectors such as government and critical infrastructure.
Natural Catastrophes	 Bangkok is particularly vulnerable to floods due to rapid urbanisation, inadequate drainage systems, land subsidence and rising sea levels. The city is not directly exposed to tsunamis, being located inland. Earthquakes constitute a latent risk for Bangkok, which occasionally feels the impact of larger earthquakes in the region. The metropolitan area is unlikely to be near the epicentre of a major earthquake.

→ Low - Moderate Risk: The main risks facing Bangkok and Chonburi and their ability to host major international events relate to seasonal flooding, pressure on urban infrastructure, and petty crime (particularly in tourism areas).






VISION

The vision for hosting the YOG in Bangkok and Chonburi is to inspire youth, connect culture and shape tomorrow.

More specifically, Thailand has the ambition to:

- "Inspire a generation of young people through sport, education and shared experience": The event would provide the youth with a platform to empower, grow, express and take responsibility in line with the values of respect, leadership and perseverance.
- "Connect youth across culture, nations and beliefs in an inclusive celebration of diversity": the YOG would serve as a powerful intercultural meeting point for youth across the fast-growing region of Southeast Asia and the world.
- "Shape a better tomorrow by building tangible legacies that extend far beyond the Games": the YOG would generate socio-economic and sport benefits, especially for underserved communities and help build new capacities. It will contribute to strengthening the integration of sport in the education system while training a new generation of volunteers.



LEGACY

The legacy objectives of a YOG in Thailand in 2030 would include:

Sport legacies:


- Positioning Thailand as an international hub for sports innovation

- Increasing public awareness on sustainability through youth-led campaigns




ALIGNMENT WITH EXISTING SOCIO-ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PLANS





VENUE MASTERPLAN: SUMMARY

OPPORTUNITIES

- 100% existing and temporary venues, with concept leveraging the masterplan of the Southeast Asian Games 2025
- The proposed concept around one urban and one beach cluster would bring distinct flavours
- Most athletes sharing one main Youth Olympic Village in the centre of Bangkok, ensuring a good YOG experience:
 - 71% of sports (22 of 31) are within one hour of the Bangkok Youth Olympic Village
 - 93% of venues within 30 mins of respective Youth Olympic Village
 - All sports / venues are located within a 65km perimeter (except for surfing, located approximately 700km from Bangkok)
- Existing Youth Olympic Village on University campus

AREAS TO MONITOR

- While providing a bed to all athletes in the main village in Bangkok would ensure a unique YOG experience and create efficiencies in the delivery of the education programmes, financial implication of bed duplication must be carefully studied
- High concentration of venues (8) at the SAT Sports
 Complex in Bangkok would require careful management of spectator flows
- Financial implications of seven temporary venues on the YOGOC budget



INTERNATIONAL SPORTS EVENTS IN SUMMER OLYMPIC DISCIPLINES IN 2016 - 2025

- **MULTI-SPORTS EVENT**
- 11 (YOUTH) WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS
- 75 WORLD CUPS
- Thailand will host the **Southeast Asian Games** (~ 12,500 athletes) in December 2025 in Bangkok and Chonburi.
- Thailand has hosted 86 World Championships or World Cups in 10 out of 31 Olympic summer sports.
- In **9 of the 31 disciplines** proposed for the YOG 2030, Thailand has organised at least one World Championship or World Cup.
- Thailand has participated in all three Summer Youth Olympic Games since 2010 and ranked 13th in Buenos Aires 2018.
- → Thailand has good experience in organising and hosting major international summer sports events
- → Bangkok can benefit from a workforce with recent event experience

TRANSPORT

TRANSPORT STRATEGY

 The transport strategy for Thailand's YOG 2030 project is based on maximum use of existing public transport. It includes several infrastructure projects that were already planned and will be completed by 2030.

• The public authority responsible for the provision and possible upgrade of any transport infrastructure, the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA), is already involved in the YOG 2030 project.

TRANSPORT INFRASTRUCTURE

- Bangkok offers multiple public transport options including the BTS SkyTrain, MRT Mass Rapid Transit, State Railway / Suburban and buses.
- 18 out of 19 competition venues in Bangkok are accessible by metro services (< 2 km from metro station).
- Road traffic is heavily congested in Bangkok, with the city ranking 2nd in congestion levels in the TomTom traffic index 2024.
- Bangkok and Chonburi are connected by a regular bus service. A high-speed railway link is planned and will be completed by 2029.

- → Thailand's transport strategy for the YOG builds on its extensive public transport infrastructure which includes BTS SkyTrain, MRT Mass Rapid Transit, State Railway / Suburban and buses.
- → The majority of venues in Bangkok are accessible by metro. The Chonburi cluster will be accessible by shuttle bus.


AIRPORT

- Bangkok International Airport (Suvarnabhumi BKK) will serve as the main port of entry into the country. In 2024, it handled approx. 60 million passengers and served a total of 127 airlines. A capacity expansion is planned as part of its 2025-2035 master plan, aiming to allow up to 150 million passengers per year. Bangkok's second airport, Don Mueang (DMK), handled approx. 30 million passengers in 2024 and served 25 airlines.
- In addition, Pattaya U-Tapao Airport (UTP), handling approx. 3 million passengers and serving 9 airlines (with expansion plans for up to 60 million per year), and Phuket International Airport (HKT), handling approx. 12.5 million passengers (targeting 18 million passengers) and serving 54 airlines, serve as gateways for the athletes in Pattaya and Phuket.

DISTANCES AND TRAVEL TIMES

- All athletes will be accommodated in close proximity to their respective venues, ensuring minimum distances and travel times.
- The average travel time will be 13 minutes in the Bangkok cluster, 31 minutes in Chonburi and TBC in Phuket.

- → The airports have sufficient capacity to welcome and handle all YOG-related travel flows.
- → Distances and travel times for the athletes to get from their accommodation to their venues are very short in the Bangkok cluster and reasonable in Chonburi (Phuket TBC), making the proposed concept very convenient and athlete-friendly.



OPPORTUNITIES

- Thailand has good experience in hosting major sports events. The country will host the Southeast Asian Games in Bangkok and Chonburi in December 2025, which could provide valuable experience to the local workforce
- Good existing transport infrastructure and capacity to adequately meet YOG needs
