00:00	<i>Aerials of Hong Kong city and Race Village; onboard from the boats</i>	<p><i>The stunning city of Hong Kong provided the backdrop for the end of leg 4 of Volvo Ocean Race 2017-18, following a demanding 5,600 miles from Melbourne.</i></p> <p><i>It was a leg that delivered all conditions from perfect trade wind sailing, to languishing in the doldrums, frightening electrical storms, and breath-taking encounters with nature.</i></p> <p><i>With the finish of leg 4 just on the horizon, some of the teams were feeling the pressure to deliver a good result.</i></p>

00:56	<i>Route tracker animation; onboard Sun Hung Kai/Scallywag</i>	<p><i>A bold tactical call leaving the doldrums paid big dividends for Hong-Kong based Sun Hung Kai Scallywag, swapping last for first. With 1,000 miles to go they’d carved out a 100-mile lead, the chance to claim a home-team victory had become a reality, so long as they could defend pole position.</i></p>

01:32	<i>Onboard Dongfeng Race Team, Vestas 11th Hour Racing</i>	<p><i>Only days earlier Dongfeng Race Team had been challenging for the lead, until a slower exit of the Doldrums allowed Vestas 11th Hour Racing to take back 2nd position in the rankings.</i></p> <p><i>The Chinese-flagged team had stood on the podium in each of the opening legs, and were doggedly chasing a leg win.</i></p>
01:52	<i>Franck Cammas Dongfeng Race Team</i>	<p><i>IV</i></p> <p><i>“From yesterday the boats in front have more wind, and it’s easier for them to stay in front, and create a big gap with us”</i></p>

02:05	<i>Onboard Sun Hung Kai/Scallywag, MAPFRE, Dongfeng Race Team, Vestas 11th Hour Racing,</i>	<p><i>Sun Hung Kai Scallywag had some unlikely support 170 miles behind them in the form of overall race leaders, MAPFRE, who’d prefer to see the leg victory and eight points go to the Hong Kong team rather than their closest competition, Dongfeng Race team and Vestas 11th Hour Racing.</i></p>

03:22	Images of Vestas 11th Hour Racing, Dongfeng Race Team, team AkzoNobel	Thirty miles from the finish, in second place, Vestas 11 th Hour Racing were involved in a tragic incident, colliding with a non-racing vessel during the night, that saw them retire from leg 4. Subsequently, Dongfeng Race Team finished second, closing the gap on overall race leaders, MAPFRE, with Simeon Tienpont's team Akzonobel taking third.
03:46	Arrivals of MAPFRE, Team Brunel and Turn the Tide on Plastic	Overall race leaders MAPFRE were fourth, Bouwe Bekking's Team Brunel took 5 th ahead of Dee Caffari and Turn the Tide on Plastic in 6 th .
03:56	Drone images of Hong Kong and Auckland, New Zealand	The teams will spend the next ten days racing and recovering in Hong Kong, before heading to Guangzhou, China. The upcoming 6,100 mile Leg 6, takes the fleet south, down into the Pacific, before finishing in the iconic City of Sails, Auckland, New Zealand.
