00:09	Sailing footage of all boats  <i>David Witt Sun Hung Kai/Scallywag</i>  Tracker animation	<i>Leg 6 of the 2017-18 Volvo Ocean Race concluded with an epic 5-team battle down the coast of New Zealand...</i>  <i>One of the closest finishes in the history of the race.</i>  <i>It was the end of a three-week, six and half thousand mile, test of mental and physical endurance, a constant battle, night and day with teams spending days racing within sight of each other.-</i>  <i>"We are doing 0.01 knots. They are doing 13 knots and are like two miles down there just going vroom"</i>  <i>The seeds were sown for the close finish nearly a week prior, 1500 miles from the finish, with the fleet split by less than a hundred miles.</i>
00:54	<i>Rob Greenhalgh MAPFRE</i>	<i>IV</i>  <i>"Anything can happen to be honest, there is a lot of potential up here for things to be different. The fleet is spread quite widely in front of us so we will see how it plays out in the next forty eight hours.</i>
01:08	Onboard Team Brunel, tracker animation	<i>Team Brunel had fought hard the whole leg, determined to get their first podium finish of the race.</i>  <i>For several days the Dutch flagged team had been losing miles on the lead trio, electing to go into stealth mode to cloak their position in an attempt to hide their losses from the other boats.</i>
01:25	<i>Bouwe Bekking Skipper Team Brunel</i>	<i>IV</i>  <i>It was quite obvious that we were absolutely falling off the pressure from the three leading boats, that's why we went to stealth mode because we could imagine that the guys ahead of us would still sail very fast so that was the lucky thing and it was great to get into stealth mode because if we hadn't then I am 100% sure that the boats would have a higher course, and the loss would have been bigger"</i>
01:48	Onboard Turn the Tide on Plastic	<i>Also hungry for a first podium finish was Dee Caffari and her multi-national crew aboard Turn the Tide on Plastic.</i>  <i>Kiwi crew member, Bianca Cook, is the first female kiwi sailor in almost two decades to take part in the race.</i>
02:05	<i>Bianca Cook Turn the Tide on Plastic</i>	<i>IV</i>  <i>"Pretty excited to be sailing into New Zealand and its pretty awesome to be able to do it in the Volvo Ocean Race – its just a dream come true."</i>
02:15	Onboard Sun Hung Kai/Scallywag and team AkzoNobel	<i>With just 800 miles to run, Sun Hung Kai/Scallywag were looking to repeat their triumphant leg 4 win into their home-port of Hong Kong... But Dutch skipper Simeon Tienpont was fighting for the first leg win of his Volvo Ocean Race career.</i>

02:30	Simeon Tienpont Skipper Team Akzonobel	<i>IV "Yeah its really good, the plan is working out and it's nice so slowly we are coming away ahead of the rest of the fleet and are in a pretty strong position right now that we wouldn't trade for anyone else, that's for sure but still it's going to be a challenge to get into good shape to the north of New Zealand. The last 200 miles in look very light"</i>
02:56	Fleet sailing past Cape Reinga, the northern tip of New Zealand  Dee Caffari, Turn the Tide on Plastic  Blair Tuke, MAPFRE	<i>Twenty days into the leg, the fleet finally made landfall at the northern tip of New Zealand... The sunrise provided a reality check on how close the final sprint to the finish would be. Intensity levels reached the breaking point with the leading trio of boats racing just meters from one another ---  "It is a lot tighter than what we were hoping for"  While behind, MAPFRE and Dongfeng were chewing up the deficit mile by mile, bringing stronger winds with them.  "That one is 100% Turn the Tide, I can see them riding on their sails "</i>
03:38	Sophie Ciszek MAPFRE	<i>IV "This was our first really good opportunity to get past them before we get there into low pressure and so we are pretty excited to get there"</i>
03:51	team AkzoNobel and Sun Hung Kai/Scallywag finish into Auckland	<i>At the early morning finish in Auckland, Simeon Tienpont and Team AkzoNobel took a historic leg win, finishing just 2 minutes ahead of Sun Hung Kai/Scallywag.  Kiwi natives Brad Farrand and Justin Ferris led the winning team into their home port of Auckland.</i>
04:07	Justin Ferris Team Akzonobel	<i>IV "You have been asking for days now what it is going to be like and it's a really cool feeling. Look at all the people here, incredible. Bloody awesome"</i>
04:20	Brad Farrand Team Akzonobel	<i>IV "to make it here to Auckland, the crowd and the support is great, I cant see it getting any better than this"</i>
04:31	MAPFRE arriving into Auckland, tracker animation	<i>Fighting back in the final stages of the leg, MAPFRE stole an improbable podium finish, gaining nearly 100 miles over the final 24 hours of racing.  The result allowed them to extend their overall race lead over their red boat rivals Dongfeng Race Team, who grabbed fourth.</i>
04:48	Charles Caudrelier Dongfeng Race Team	<i>IV "It was good to have been fourth but bad to finish before Turn the Tide because we gave more points to MAPFRE and of course we finish too late. Brunel did a big mistake and Turn the Tide have been very unlucky today so we managed to come back. So sorry for Turn the Tide"</i>
05:10	<i>Turn the Tide on Plastic on board and on the docks</i>	<i>The great comeback for the red boats signaled heart-break for Turn the Tide on Plastic who would have to settle for fifth.  Although their best result to date, it's a bitter pill, when only hours earlier Dee Caffari and her crew were holding down well-earned third place, and battling with the leading duo.</i>
05:35	Images of boatyard and boats being lifted off the water	<i>The teams will now spend the next ten days recovering in Auckland, with the boats undergoing servicing and repairs, ahead of the March 10 New Zealand Herald In-Port race.</i>
